OUR VILLAGE HALL- Robert Hardy writes:

The summer has been much occupied with plans to replace our electric heating system (which proved inadequate during the extreme cold of last winter) with something more efficient and economical.

Grants from the Big Lottery fund and the Quantock Hills AONB, topped up from our reserves, mean that we can afford to install a gas-fired system and work is already under way. The unpopular arrangement of pay-as-you go by meter will be replaced by a new scale of charges, revised to incorporate heating costs. We hope to be up and running by mid-October.

At the same time, we plan to put in suspended ceilings to improve the insulation of the Hall before winter sets in. Meanwhile, various items of routine maintenance have been carried out and the Play Area has passed its annual inspection.

Events coming up are our AGM on 9 November and another evening with Martin Cox's "Regal Rhythm" on 11 November.

There is not much to report since the last Pumpings was published as most of us have been on holiday! What may be of interest is our forthcoming programme of events in the run up to Christmas.

In **mid-October** we shall launch a **Wildlife Habitat Competition** together with the AONB and Friends of Quantock. The idea is to promote community awareness and involvement in conserving and enhancing the flora and fauna of the Quantock Hills through encouraging the creation of new wildlife habitats.

The competition is open to parish councils, community groups, organisations, charities or individuals within the Quantock Hills area who wish to enhance or create wildlife areas within their community. There will be some funding from the Quantock Hills Sustainable Development Fund for the winners.

On **Friday 4 November** in our **Village Hall from 6:45 to 9:30 pm** we shall be offering a **fish & chip supper** followed by a talk by experts on **Heat Pumps**.

Over the last two years QE has encouraged the use of PV to generate your own electricity. Although that is still a "no-brainer" we now wish to provide information on ways to beat back the rising cost of space and water heating through the use of Heat Pumps.

After the experts have spoken, local people

who have actually installed heat pumps will let us know whether they think it is a good idea or not.

On **Saturday 10 December** we shall be having a **QE Christmas Green Fair** in **Bishops Lydeard Village Hall**. The Fair will run from **2:00 to 4:30 pm** and will be in a similar format to the one we held in Kingston St. Mary last year when over 200 people visited.

There will be stalls for solar hot water and solar electricity; electric bikes and scooters; insulation for your home; food and veg boxes; bread making; delicious cakes; eco household products; jewellery; plants, seeds and bulbs; pottery; prints & cards; Friends of the Earth, Somerset Wildlife Trust, Sustrans, and the Quantock Hills AONB.

HISTORY IN OUR MIDST - John Lees writes:

My great (x 4) grandfather (a Hillyar) was Captain of a ship, HMS Phoebe, at the beginning of the 19th Century. When the war of 1812 (between America and England) broke out, HMS Phoebe was sent to the South Pacific (via Cape Horn) to stop an American frigate, the Essex, under the command of Captain Porter, which was plundering British ships on the lucrative South Seas trade routes.

It was not an easy task for a sailing ship without radar After several months searching, Phoebe holed up in Valparaiso harbour (Peru) to replenish essential stores. There, lo and behold, she found the Essex doing the same thing. As it was a neutral harbour, the two ships could only glare at each other.

For nearly two months the stalemate lasted, with the crews fraternising in the bars ashore, and the officers mixing at the houses of the local gentry. Eventually, one stormy night, the Essex up anchored and set sail, closely followed by the Phoebe. The two ships fought in Valparaiso Bay and Phoebe won!

Chivalry was the norm in those days. Captain Porter and his crew (of which David Farragut, a ten year old midshipman and the future head of the US Navy was one) were put aboard a requisitioned merchant ship and sent back to America.
