Key Messages this week

1. Emergency measures announced for rough sleepers

In response to weather warnings forecasting high winds and sub-zero temperatures over the forthcoming weekend, SWT is offering emergency accommodation to protect anyone sleeping rough within the district.

From today, Friday, 26 November, the Council will activate its Severe Weather Emergency Protocol (SWEP), which seeks to identify and accommodate rough sleepers during periods of extreme weather.

SWT's Rough Sleeper Initiative Team is very much focused on early intervention and through its outreach service and networking with partner agencies, works tirelessly to identify and accommodate rough sleepers prior to adverse changes in weather.

Members of the public with concerns for individuals they believe to be sleeping rough are encouraged to report their sightings via streetlink.org.uk.

Eat Taunton which was due to take place on Saturday 27 November has unfortunately been **cancelled** due to the Yellow Weather Warning issued by the Met Office.

8. Somerset Waste Partnership Services (SWP)

Schools across Somerset are urged to put their hands up for the first ever Somerset Waste Partnership (SWP) eco-school grants.

As part of its commitment to encouraging waste reduction, reuse and recycling, SWP is offering grants of £500 to up to 50 schools to help them participate in the Eco Schools programme.

Eco-Schools is an international initiative operating in 68 countries. It gives schools a structured approach to engaging and empowering pupils and teachers in projects and initiatives that help protect the environment.

Whether it's taking the first step on the tried and trusted programme or progressing towards the coveted "Green Flag", the SWP grants will help schools on their Eco-School journey.

They are open to primary and secondary schools and the simple application process is open from now until the end of May 2022.

The grants can be used for all kinds of projects and initiatives, the only proviso being that schools choose "waste" as one of its topics on the way through seven steps to green flag status.

The resulting government decision is that we adopt a single unitary authority for the whole of Somerset. We are committed to working together for a new Somerset Council that: frees up resources to invest in our communities and high-quality services; grows Somerset's

voice nationally, helping to deliver the investment in business and infrastructure that our county deserves; and drives action to tackle climate change.

Somerset County Council (SCC)

SCC Highway Maintenance Update

After a quiet spell of weather including, typical for November, still, overcast, and misty days, stormy conditions are on their way, with strong north winds predominating from “Storm Arwen”. Along with the highway problems that this will cause, SCC will also have to carry out road salting actions between the bands of rain.

In **Carhampton**, the Somerset River Authority funded drainage improvement works are progressing well. The team have been working on the Orchard Road phase of this major project. They have also constructed a new manhole on the A39.

Drainage works at Exford Road, **Winsford**, have now been completed and the new winter weather station on the **A38 Wellington Relief Road** has been installed.

Works for the week commencing 29 November include footway repairs on the **A358 Taunton Road** at **Bicknoller** (temporary traffic signals) and carriageway repairs at **Greenway Crescent, Taunton** (temporary road closure).

Department for Environment, Food, & Rural Affairs (DEFRA) The Farming Investment Fund is now open.

The Farming Investment Fund (FIF) provides grants to improve productivity and bring environmental benefits. FIF is made up of 2 separate funds:

- **Farming Equipment and Technology Fund** (for grants between £2,000 and £25,000). This fund provides grants towards the cost of equipment and technology to improve the productivity of farms in a sustainable way. The Round 1 application period opened on 16 November 2021 and **will close on 7 January 2022**.
- **Farming Transformation Fund** (for grants between £35,000 and £500,000) This fund provides grants towards large capital items to help businesses improve productivity, profitability, and environmental sustainability. They are:
 - Water Management
 - Improving Farm Productivity
 - Adding Value

Exmoor National Park (ENP) Invites Bids for Small Grants tackling Climate Change on Exmoor

ENP are particularly calling for projects that help mitigate and adapt to climate change in the next round of Partnership Fund applications, ahead of the 4 January 2022 deadline. Expressions of interest are invited until mid-December.

One of the main aims of the recent COP26 conference was to: *Adapt to protect communities and natural habitats*. Grants of up to £2,500 are being offered for projects that support that aim and demonstrate the vital part that communities and local groups can play in responding to the climate and nature emergencies.

To be eligible, projects must involve local community, have long term benefit, and make a difference for people, place and prosperity on Exmoor – the three key themes in the National Park's Partnership Plan. Project ideas that aren't related to climate change but fit the criteria of helping to keep Exmoor special or connecting people with the area's special qualities are also welcomed.

Maritime and Coastguard Agency (MCA)

Annual Report Published

The Maritime and Coastguard Agency has this week published their annual report highlighting the vital work they undertook during a challenging 12-month period.

Amongst the roster of work over the past year, the MCA repatriated seafarers from across the world including those not on the UK flag, oversaw the UK Ship Register ranked as first on the Paris Memorandum of Understanding league table of high performing Flag States and dealt with its busiest summer on record.

As well as taking on this critical work it was still business as usual for the MCA responding to more than 33,000 incidents at the coast spurred on by record breaking numbers of people visiting the UK coasts.

These crucial rescue activities were supported by the rollout of brand-new British-built helicopters which began search and rescue operations from ten of HM Coastguard's bases across the UK.

The annual report which covers April 2020 to March 2021 also highlighted the role investment in new technology, training and innovation has played in keeping the MCA at the forefront of the maritime world.

COVID-19

Somerset COVID Cases

The number of cases of COVID-19 in Somerset has increased. Many of the cases continue to be among school and college age children (particularly primary schools) as well as staff within education settings.

This clearly shows COVID-19 is still present in Somerset and reminds us all to continue to wear a face-covering in crowded and enclosed spaces, regularly wash hands and undertake lateral flow tests if we don't have symptoms and are meeting people who are outside our own household. If people have any symptoms of COVID-19 such as a high temperature, a new and continuous cough, a loss or change to the sense of taste or smell, they should self-isolate immediately and book a PCR test.

In the week up to 14 November approximately 88,698 tests were carried out across the county with 2,551 new confirmed cases. The rates have increased in the last reporting week to 453.7 per 100,000. This is below the South-West but higher than the national average.

Hospitalisation data for Somerset has decreased to 50 COVID-19 in patients in Somerset hospitals. The number of people in hospital with COVID-19 is higher than last year during wave1 and wave 2 of the pandemic.

Have you had your jabs? Update on COVID-19 Booster Programme

As per the announcement last week, booster jabs are now available for people aged over 40 years to book, alongside the over 50s and those considered to be at risk. To receive a booster jab, it must be six months or more since the receipt of the second vaccine, but you can now book your appointment five months after your last dose. The boosters are very important as they significantly reduce the likelihood of serious illness or hospitalisation should you catch COVID-19 so, if offered, please make a booking without delay.

Once you have received the national invitation you will be able to go on the **National Booking site**: nhs.uk/CovidVaccination or call 119. Vaccination centres across Somerset remain busy, but with slots becoming available all the time, please remember to check the National Booking Service regularly.

Vaccination Centres offer walk in clinics for 12–15-year-olds

COVID-19 vaccination centres in Somerset are now offering walk-in clinics for those aged 12 to 15. This is part of a local drive to make it as easy as possible for local people to get vaccinated.

Until recently, those in the 12- to 15-year-old age group were being vaccinated in schools or could book a jab at a number of vaccination centres across the county. Now families also have the option of getting their children vaccinated at a walk-in clinic. You can find out which centres are offering walk in clinics, including those for 12 to 15 year olds on the [“grab-a-jab” website](#).

It has also been announced that 16/17-year-olds will be able to book their second jab, 12 weeks after their first.

Children will also continue to be offered the COVID-19 jab through their schools

Stay safe and help prevent the spread of COVID-19

Coronavirus remains a serious health risk. You should stay cautious to help protect yourself and others.

- Meet outside, or open windows and doors for indoor visitors
- If you think you have symptoms stay at home and [take a PCR test](#)
- Wear face coverings in crowded places and on public transport
- Check in to venues when you go out
- Wash your hands with soap regularly, and for at least 20 seconds
- [Get vaccinated](#).

Twice weekly testing

For people who do not have symptoms of COVID-19, it remains very important to participate in twice weekly asymptomatic testing if you are out and about and meeting up with people. Please make sure that you take a test **before** you travel anywhere and if it is positive, stay at home and arrange a PCR test.

Anyone who has COVID-19 symptoms, should book a PCR and not attend school or work. Do not take a LFD if symptomatic. PHE advise all parents, staff and pupils to take the supervised PCR testing route where available. Ask for this when you arrive at the test centre and someone will take the swab for you to maximise the quality of the test.

From 1 November there will be a reduction in the opening hours at regional and local testing sites. Instead of opening from 8am until 8pm, they will operate from 8am until 6pm – 2 hours less per day.

Please continue to use LFD and PCR tests as you normally would, the SCC PH advice remains, if you are showing any symptoms of COVID-19 or have a positive LFD test get a PCR test and if this is positive stay at home and self-isolate for ten days to avoid infecting others.

SCC PH advice remains consistent with national guidance:

- Only use twice weekly LFD testing for asymptomatic cases
- Make sure you do an LFD according to the instructions and at least 30 minutes after eating or drinking
- If you get a positive LFD or have symptoms, self-isolate and get a PCR and **use the supervised PCR testing route at test centre to get the best quality test**

You are reminded that if you have previously received a positive Covid PCR test result, you should not re-test yourself by either using a rapid lateral flow kit or by having another PCR test within 90 days of the first positive result **unless** you develop any new symptoms of COVID-19.

Q I have run out of Lateral flow testing kits. How do I get replacements?

A There are now several routes available to receive twice weekly testing.

- **Get a test kit sent to your home** – If you are unable to get to a test centre to collect a test kit you can [order a home testing kit to be sent to your home](#).
- **Collect a test from a pharmacy** – You will be able to use this service if you are over the age of 18 without symptoms. Participating pharmacies will provide a box of 7 rapid tests to use twice a week at home.

Action Fraud

Hundreds fall victim to lottery scams in just seven months

What is lottery fraud?

Criminals will contact unsuspecting victims informing them they have won a lottery or prize draw. The victim is then informed that they will need to pay an advance fee to receive their winnings. In reality, the winnings are non-existent, and it is an attempt to steal the victim's money, personal or financial information.

Between April and October 2021, Action Fraud received 629 reports of lottery fraud, with 89 per cent of reports mentioning well-known prize draws. Impersonation of People's Postcode Lottery accounted for almost half (49 per cent) of all reports. Almost three quarters of victims (70 per cent) were aged over 50, with those aged over 65 accounting for 40 per cent of reports.

Fraudsters use gift cards as a form of payment as they can be easily redeemed and sold on. The criminals don't need the physical card to redeem the value as they ask the victims to share the serial code on the back of the card with them. In other instances, victims reported being asked for personal and financial information in order to obtain their alleged winnings. Some victims reported providing their bank details thinking they would be sent a small payment to verify the account. In reality, criminals will use these details to steal the victim's money.
